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MESSAGE FROM CHAIRMAN HORSFORD



We are stronger than ever.

Since the 118th Congress was sworn-in ten months ago, the Congressional Black Caucus has been fighting FOR THE PEOPLE.

We have been fighting to preserve our Democracy, fighting to protect voting rights and create fairer districts, fighting for public safety and police accountability, fighting to protect a woman's right to choose, fighting against the expulsion of Black elected officials, fighting archaic traditions that block progress, and of course, fighting extremist Republicans and a judiciary who would rather erase us — who want to see us less free and with fewer fundamental rights.

This past quarter, the landscape of our national politics shifted. In the wake of Supreme Court decisions on affirmative action and student loan forgiveness — and with challenges to congressional maps that would give Black voters more power — conservative attacks on Black people and Blackness have become more concerted and overt.

More than a dozen conservative attorneys general have sent letters to the nation's largest companies warning them that explicit racial quotas and preferences in hiring and promotions would be challenged with legal action. A federal judge in Tennessee struck down a provision in the Small Business Administration's 8(a) Business Development program threatening billions in government contracting dollars for historically disadvantaged groups. And charges against "wokeism" have turned to assaults on organizations like the Fearless Fund that provide growth financing to businesses for Black women and women of color.

In anticipation of these attacks, we set out on a plan to get out of Washington, D.C., and take our message directly to the American people. Through the Congressional Black Caucus Institute, we executed the Democracy for the People summer of action in 14 cities around the country which concluded in August during the 60th Anniversary of the March on Washington. Our message was clear to those who wish to see us less free and with fewer fundamental rights and opportunities of advancement: *We know what you are doing, we will call you out, and we will not stop fighting back.*

As a result of the work of the CBC, our allies, and voters who refused to be silenced, federal judges struck down Republican-drawn congressional maps that disenfranchised Black voters in Alabama, Louisiana, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida. We were successful in our efforts to add a second majority-Black district in Alabama and are working to achieve similar results in Louisiana, Florida, Texas and Georgia. Together, we fought back on attempts to distort our nation's history by banning books and erasing Black history. And together, we made clear that the CBC will stand up to ultra extremists who are trying to hold the American people hostage as they impose their radical agenda.

In the months to come, the CBC will fight to hold the line on diversity, equity and inclusion programs and policies in the corporate sector, institutions of higher education and throughout the federal government. We will continue to coordinate our efforts with civil rights leaders, Black business organizations, state and local Black elected officials, and labor leaders around the country. We will continue to promote public safety and police accountability to keep our communities safe. And we will set forth a Black economic prosperity and wealth agenda to provide opportunities for those who have been held back for too long.

We invite those who support these efforts and policy goals to join us by supporting CBC Members in our districts and through constituent and community organizing opportunities. Together, we will win the day, win the week and win the month on behalf of the more than 120 million constituents that our Members collectively represent.

02 ON THE ISSUES



DEMOCRACY & RACE IN AMERICA

Black people are under attack in America. From the Supreme Court to our school boards, the attacks against Black people and Blackness are coordinated, well-funded, and are coming from every side.

The CBC made clear that we will not stop fighting back against the attacks on Black people – whether it's the erosion of our fundamental rights, election denialism and partisan gerrymandering, charges against 'wokeism,' or whitewashing our history by banning books.

VOTING RIGHTS & REDISTRICTING

In absolute defiance of the Supreme Court ruling in Allen v. Milligan, which required states like Alabama and Louisiana to give Black voters more voting power and fairer representation, Republicancontrolled legislatures refused.

As a result of the tireless work of the CBC led by our own Rep. Terri Sewell and Rep. Troy Carter, and others like Attorney Eric General Holder, judges struck down Republican-drawn maps in Alabama, Louisiana and Florida for discriminating against Black voters. The CBC will continue to fight against the voter suppression that plagues our country and impedes access to the ballot box, particularly in Black communities.

EDUCATION & BLACK HISTORY

Amid nationwide book bans and distortions of our nation's history, the Florida State Board of Education adopted new standards for African American history for K-12 students suggesting that slavery was beneficial for enslaved people.

The CBC issued a letter led by Chairman Steven Horsford, Rep. Frederica Wilson, Rep. Maxwell Alejandro Frost, and Rep. Sheila Cherfilus-McCormick, demanding that the Florida Board of Education immediately reverse its decision and put an end to the attacks on Black history in the state.

DEMOCRACY FOR THE PEOPLE

The Congressional Black Caucus Institute executed the nationwide Democracy for the People summer of action in 14 cities around the country, which culminated in Washington, DC on the 60th Anniversary of the March on Washington.

The CBCI registered voters and trained organizers to address the ongoing threats to our democracy and fundamental freedoms, such as the expulsion of Black legislators, attacks on voting rights, and ideologicallydriven Supreme Court decisions on affirmative action, student debt cancellation, and abortion rights.





DE&I, SMALL BUSINESS CONTRACTING AND BLACK WEALTH CREATION

In the wake of the SCOTUS affirmative action ruling, more than a dozen conservative attorneys general sent letters warning the nation's largest companies that explicit racial quotas and preferences in hiring and promotions would be met with legal action.

Additionally, a federal judge in Tennessee struck down a provision in the Small Business Administration's 8(a) Business Development program which was meant to be a pipeline to billions in government contracting dollars for historically disadvantaged groups.

The CBC convened a war room meeting to devise a response to the ongoing assault by conservative activists on DE&I initiatives in the private sector.

ENGAGING THE BLACK LABOR MOVEMENT

The CBC convened a meeting with national Black labor leaders as a follow-up to the CBC's "Black Labor Leader" roundtable held earlier this year in Boston, MA during the NAACP conference. Together, members of the CBC and members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), and the Coalition of Black Trade Unionists (CBTU) discussed issues such as the skills gap, labor shortages, unemployment rates, grants for skills training and labor apprenticeship programs.

ENGAGING WITH BLACK LEGISLATORS

The CBC convened a meeting with the National Black Caucus of State Legislators (NBCSL), National Organization of Black Elected Legislative Women (N.O.B.E.L. Women) and the African American Mayors Association (AAMA).

The meeting allowed the CBC and Black legislators from around the country to engage in conversation about legislative, executive, and community-based solutions to fortify our democracy, organize in our communities and hold those accountable that are responsible for suppressing our fundamental freedoms.

GUN REFORM, COMMUNITY VIOLENCE INTERVENTION AND POLICE ACCOUNTABILITY

The CBC held a private meeting and press conference with the Mothers of the Movement and Attorney Benjamin Crump to provide an update on Congress' public safety legislation and to let families affected by police violence know that we are still doing all we can to pass meaningful reform.

Additionally, the CBC held a private meeting with rapper and gun violence prevention advocate, Quavo, to discuss gun violence prevention and community violence intervention. The CBC will not stop until we achieve greater police accountability, standards, and transparency, and finally put an end to senseless gun violence to keep our communities safe.




