**Budget**

Programs That Would Be Eliminated	Programs That Would Lose Funding
<p><b>Community Services Block Grant</b></p> <p>This federal, anti-poverty block grant funds the work of local agencies to reduce poverty, revitalize low-income communities, and help families struggling to make ends meet.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Medicaid</b></p> <p>This program provides health benefits to low-income families and children, pregnant women, seniors, and people with disabilities.</p> <p><b>\$800 Billion Cut Over 10 Years</b></p>
<p><b>Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program</b></p> <p>This program keeps seniors and families in emergencies from losing their heat in the winter and air conditioning in the summer. It also helps homeowners lower their monthly energy costs</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Social Security</b></p> <p>President Trump’s budget cuts Social Security disability programs, which help people replace lost earnings when they are physically unable to work. Social Security is a program that all Americans pay into with the expectation that it will be there for them when they need it.</p> <p><b>\$72 Billion Cut Over 10 Years</b></p>

<p><b>Choice Neighborhoods</b></p> <p>This program helps local stakeholders – such as public housing authorities, cities, schools, police, residents, business owners, nonprofits, and private developers – come together to turn distressed public housing into livable space while transforming their neighborhoods.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program</b></p> <p>SNAP, often called food stamps, helps people who are struggling to put food on the table for themselves and their families.</p> <p><b>\$193 Billion Cut Over 10 Years</b></p>
<p><b>OSHA Training Grants</b></p> <p>Each year, millions of workers suffer an injury serious enough to take them away from their normal work responsibilities, a burden that costs employers an estimated \$1 billion per week. OSHA is the primary federal agency charged with enforcing workforce health and safety requirements that protect these hardworking Americans and provides much-needed training grants to employers.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Pell Grants</b></p> <p>These are grants that are awarded to low-income college students who need help paying their tuition.</p> <p><b>\$4 Billion One-Time Cut</b></p>
<p><b>Legal Services Corporation</b></p> <p>This organization provides legal help to survivors of domestic abuse, renters facing eviction, veterans seeking their hard-earned benefits, and others with serious legal needs.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Federal Work Study Program</b></p> <p>This program helps to ensure that low-income college students are able to get jobs while in college.</p> <p><b>\$488 Million Over 10 Years</b></p>
<p><b>Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation</b></p> <p>The corporation seeks to promote reinvestment in urban, suburban and rural communities by having local banks provide funding to efforts led by residents and local government.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Earned Income Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit</b></p> <p>The EITC and CTC are tax credits for low-income people who work and care for children.</p> <p><b>\$40.4 Billion Cut Over 10 Years</b></p>

<p><b>Economic Development Administration</b></p> <p>In 2015, EDA invested 38% of its funds in poor and working-class neighborhoods, including many with high minority populations.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Temporary Assistance for Needy Families</b></p> <p>TANF provides help so that families with serious needs can provide basic necessities for their children and care for them in their own homes.</p> <p><b>\$21 billion Cut Over 10 Years</b></p>
<p><b>Minority Business Development Agency</b></p> <p>This is the sole agency dedicated to helping minority-owned businesses succeed and grow. Collectively, minority-owned businesses across the nation have a \$1 trillion economic impact and provide 5.8 million jobs.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Social Services Block Grant</b></p> <p>This program helps states deliver social services to their citizens, including but not limited to: adult protective services; case management; child care; homemaker services; protective services and foster care for children; shelter services for individuals and families that are experiencing homelessness; and teen parent assessment and teen pregnancy prevention.</p> <p><b>\$16 Billion Over 10 Years</b></p>
<p><b>National Infrastructure Investments (TIGER)</b></p> <p>This nationwide competitive program, also called TIGER,” creates jobs by funding investments in transportation infrastructure. The American Society of Civil Engineers rates our nation’s infrastructure as a “D+” and estimates the need for a \$4.49 trillion investment by 2025. TIGER grants fund projects to repair crumbling roads and bridges and bring public transportation to communities that have been forgotten.</p> <p><b>Eliminated</b></p>	<p><b>Significant Cuts to Federal Agencies</b></p> <p>A 31.4 percent cut to the Environmental Protection Agency budget, 29.1 percent cut to the State Department, 20.5 percent to Agriculture, 19.8 percent to Labor, 16.2 percent to Health and Human Services, 15.8 percent to Commerce, 13.2 percent to Housing and Urban Development, 12.7 percent to Transportation, and 10.9 percent to Interior.</p> <p><b>See Above</b></p>
